Tower Bridge

In November of 1998, Pat and I went on a vacation to the Indian Ocean islands of Reunion and Mauritius. Mauritius is a former British colony that became an independent state on March 12, 1968. Reunion is an integral part



of the French Republic. On the way home, we stopped in London and spent a few days sightseeing.

While in London, one of the things that we did was to walk across the Tower Bridge that spans the Thames River. The accompanying photo that I took shows the Tower Bridge.

Construction of the Tower Bridge was completed in June of 1894 and during the reign of Queen Victoria. It is a suspension bridge that is eight hundred feet long and two hundred and thirteen feet high. It is one of London's most recognized landmarks.

The stamp at the top is Great Britain Scott#2070 that was issued on September 10, 2002.

Editor's Forum

Member Robert Weidman has taken the “Been There - Done That” theme to heart and has sent in articles that tie his & Pat’s travels to various stamps. Even if you’re not a world-wide traveler, there are many US stamps that can probably apply to your life somehow!

If submitting images of stamps for articles, please provide a clear scan of 300 dpi resolution. Unless there is a relevant postmark or cancel on the stamp, mint stamps are preferred for article illustrations. Stamps should be on a black background if possible so that the perforations are visible, and aligned properly horizontally/vertically (and if not, please leave sufficient black space around the stamp so that I can use Photoshop to properly rotate the stamp into position). Even if a stamp is off by 1 degree, it shows up. To make scanning stamps easier, align them in a black stock sheet, then align that against the edge of the scanner.

Suva, Fiji

You could have saved 4.6% on your purchase of stamps at Costco recently (as of mid-March). This was of course, limited to a booklet of flag stamps.

I was reading in the January 2017 issue of "Variable" that there was a "China 2016 Asian International Stamp Exhibition" held in Nanning, China. While it didn't state how many attendees that this show had, it did state that Nanning, with a population of 7 million (which is roughly the size of the DFW Metroplex at 6.5 million) has 200 philatelic organizations with a total membership of 15,000 !

Granbury Meeting Minutes

When I was fortunate enough to be selected to be the Executive Director of the American Topical Association in 2003, I really didn't have any idea of the scope of the job. It was varied and in addition to being able to use the business and philatelic background I had, it gave me a chance to learn how to adapt both of those life experiences to something that was a large variant of what I had been used to.

Learning never stops but some of us embrace those opportunities to learn more about areas in which we have strong interests. It was in my second or third year of the six years that I spent there, that I decided to run a survey of our members to get more information about the people who belonged to the ATA and where their interests lay. I recall from the survey finding out that men members outnumbered female members by about a 5 to 1 margin. The average age of the male collectors was 67 while for the women it was 64. What really surprised me though was the fact that we had so many doctors, lawyers and business leaders in the organization. I don't recall the totals but I'm pretty sure that over 40% had degrees and about 20% had advanced degrees.

So with some of those people who responded to the survey I went a little deeper and found that enjoyment of the hobby grew with those who loved the research that was involved in specializing in some aspect of their choosing in philately. There is a lot of information to be found in most of the avenues of philately if people really want to add to their knowledge and speaking from my own and my wife's experiences, it is amazing how much we have learned as we considered and studied our own interests. I've had the fortune of being one of the first to learn about several aspects of Astrophilately and the US space programs that had not been uncovered by people before me.

Karen has uncovered some stories that have been told so often in so many different places that there are hundreds of variants.

When stamp collecting becomes "philately" it opens up a surprising amount of information to the collector. My Webster's unabridged dictionary defines philately as "Coming from the Greek philos (loving) and ateleia (exemption from tax). The collection and study of postage stamps, postmarks, stamped envelopes, etc. usually as a hobby."

In short, a philatelist is someone who loves to study postal items. That is what attracts so many professionals to a hobby that most people who don't understand this "childhood" pastime. Whether an adult has a degree or not, the lure of the hobby is in studying some aspect of it that one loves. There aren't many pastimes around that one can carry from childhood

Been There, Done That

Recycling

Growing up in 1960's Switzerland meant that you got to recycle! Switzerland is a small country with relatively few natural resources to make packaging materials from domestic sources, so no silica / sand to make glass, no crude oil to refine into plastics. There are however trees to make paper and cardboard.

Never-the-less, given the small size of Switzerland, they need to keep landfill sizes to a minimum, so trash needs to be minimized.

One usually had to pay a deposit in Switzerland in the 1960's on certain glass bottles, usually soft drinks and mineral water. The deposit fee on a 1 liter bottle was sFr0.50 (about 12¢ at that time, or the equivalent of 75¢ in today's money). That was quite a bit, and was a good incentive for you to return bottles back to the store! It was also some nice pocket change when you're a kid and you find some bottles left behind. Remember, we're talking 1960's here!

Yogurt glasses were usually returned to the store to be sent back to the dairies for refilling. Yes, not plastic yogurt cups like



now, but the yogurt containers were made of glass! Beer, wine and liquor bottles and other miscellaneous glass packaging didn't have a deposit and people were expected to drop them off in recycling bins, such as the one shown above, with "green", "brown" and "clear" glass clearly marked. The picture above I took in Switzerland in 1981 and was used in a college term paper about *Food & Beverage Packaging in Switzerland*, where amongst other things I noted that Americans used 3 times as much packaging materials annually than the Swiss. That translated to per capita household waste of 552 lbs for the Swiss and 1,635 lbs for Americans. I'm sure those numbers

are much higher today, especially now that most soft drink and water bottles are made of plastic!

Given the previous numbers, that also meant that Swiss trash cans can be smaller. To wit: the picture to the left shows an actual Swiss trashcan from 1971 (in the front), and a typical US trash can (~30 gallon size). This trash can was brought over to the USA as part of our move and survived all these years at my parents house. I am now using it to store pet food.

Cross Harbor Tunnel

The photo below was taken on our vacation to the Far East in 2003 is of the entrance to the Cross Harbor Tunnel on the Kowloon side of Hong Kong. The tunnel links Kowloon to Hong Kong island.



The stamp is Hong Kong Scott #270, issued on October 20, 1972 for the inauguration of the tunnel. Work on the tunnel began several years before. The tunnel goes under Hong Kong harbor which separates Hong Kong island from the mainland. Back in 1970, while I was in the Navy on R&R in Hong Kong, work was underway to connect the two sides. Up until the tunnel was completed, so that cars, trucks, busses and other vehicles could cross to the other side, the only way to get back and forth was to take a ferry (see the February 2017 issue of *Stamping Around* for an article about the Star Ferry). Additional tunnels have been dug under the harbor since that time to the connection.

Noted in Passing...

I happened to be at a Barnes & Noble bookstore the other day and was pleasantly surprised to see a stamp magazine in their magazine area. The magazine is "Stamps" and is from the UK and sold for something like \$12! But why would they choose to import a UK stamp magazine when Linn's "monthly" magazine would be more relevant to US reading audiences?



Back in 1996 when I established my PO Box in Plano, I chose the large size that could hold up to 2 full reams of paper (in terms of size). I traveled more at that time, and after a week, that box was chock full and overflowing. The picture taken recently shows a more current scenario, just 2 to 4 small mail pieces a day on average, and at that rate, it would take a month to fill up.

So, the USPS is definitely correct in that 1st class mail volume has declined (definitely less junk mail...). But even as a stamp collector that is used to getting a fair amount of [stamp or philatelic-related] mail, it is definitely far less, and finding actual stamps used as postage is now limited to mail sent by other collectors.
